

OUR PARTNERSHIP WITH LUSANGAZI HORTICULTURE FARMERS GROUP IN PICTURES

Msika wa Mlimi Project (Market for a farmer)

The project firstly entered into partnership with horticulture farmers at Lusangazi, in the outskirts of Mzuzu City. These are the first farmers to be supported with agricultural equipment and then linked to formal and structured markets.

On 1st July 2019 we engaged the farmers to introduce our intentions to partner with them and this is the time the purpose of the project was explained.

After this partnership, we started visiting their fields to appreciate the quality of crops they have and advise them on how they can come up with high quality produce.

Through our voluntary work and effort, we started searching for markets for these farmers. We engaged the local media including the state-owned Malawi Broadcasting Station (MBC) TV to widen the visibility of these farmers on the local market.

In December 2019, the project secured a grant of US\$683.56 from World Connect to boost the production of the farmers through buying of treadle pumps, sprayers and seeds. These items were officially handed over to farmers on Tuesday, 14th January 2020. The equipment will support initial 25 farmers out of the 57 farmers due to limited resources.
